




AN OCCASIONAL WALK ALONG THE

Along Monastery Road past Pant y Wacco and "The Rock at Lloc" pub.


Met an Anglesey couple at Maen Achwyfan.



## TRELAWNYD TO ST. ASAPH




Number 19 bus again, this time from Prestatyn to Trelawnyd. Called in St. Michael's Church then followed the Pilgrim's Way through farmland

and Woods along the Flintshire/Denbighshire border. Well signposted but very muddy in places, and at one point I had to carefully straddle an electric fence.



Called in St. Asaph cathedral then caught a bus to Rhyl and another back to Prestatyn.



### ST. ASAPH TO HENLLAN

Left the car in Henllan and took the N<sup>o</sup> 66 bus to Denbigh and the N<sup>o</sup> 51 to St. Asaph. Had a coffee and a flapjack in the Fair Trade Cafe then walked down through the town, past the famous Foxons fly-fishing shop and Pen-y-Clint. Called in Cefn church to stamp my book and met a bloke who said he used to sail on Menai Strait One Designs in the regattas years ago. (like me)

Past the limestone caves and over Bont-newydd crossing the river Elwy. Cefn Estate seems to have the area sorted up -

"Private fishing, no canoeing, no bathing, no entry..." Detoured from the official Pilgrim's Way here due to infrequent buses, and headed up the steep hill through Woods to Henllan.

(Deer Management taking place here with high velocity rifles). Jays, Gt. Spotted Woodpecker, Treecreepers, squirrels and another Goldcrest. When I arrived back at the car it finally stopped raining!

to Llansannan.


Arrived 5:30 - Just getting dark.




Followed the Clwydian Way as far as Gors Llyn Gwyn, then the Pilgrim's Way footpath to Gwytheryn. Nice sunny day but cold N'ly wind - good views of the snow-covered Carneddau.

Must be pretty bleak up here in real winter weather. Got a bit lost around Llethr farm but soon found the little Pilgrim's Way arrows again.

Watched a dozen Red Kites close above me, Ravens doing somersaults, a kestral, a Sparrow Hawk, Fieldfare and hundreds of Starlings.

After Gwytheryn (where the pub was shut!) I walked along the quiet lane following the lovely Afon Cledwen, and finally into Llangernyw along the riverside footpath.


SNOWDROPS



## TAL-Y-CAFN TO LLANFAIRFECHAN



THE COFFIN PATH

STONE CIRCLE

Parked on the front in Llanfairfechan and caught a train to Llandudno Junction and another to Tal-y-cafn. Walked across the bridge over the river Conwy and up to Ty'n-y-groes, then along a narrow lane to Rowen.

I had hoped to get a coffee but everywhere was shut. The last shop shut a couple of years ago.

Stamped this book in Capel Seion and picked up some handy local walk leaflets from the "Book Swap" telephone kiosk.

Talked to a local gardener who told me 28 of the houses in the village are now holiday homes.

Sheep climb up through Parc Mawr (Woodland Trust) and on along the "Coffin Path" to St. Celynnin's church, one of the oldest in Wales, with a holy well (frozen over today) in the churchyard. Lovely day now with blue sky and amazing views over the Great Orme, the Conwy estuary and over to Colwyn Heights. Onwards over the moors towards Penmaenmawr. So many tracks up here I had to check the map constantly to see I was on the correct one. At one point I was on three named paths at the same time: The Pilgrim's Way, the North Wales Path and the Wales Coast Path (upland section). Past some impressive stone circles then down the old quarry tracks to Llanfairfechan. Watched a flock of about 15 Choughs enjoying the updraughts.




(8) LLANFAIRFECHAN TO BANGOR

Number 5 bus from Bangor to Llanfairfechan and walked down to the promenade. Met the Beaumaris sailing crowd just setting off to walk over the top to Conwy. I followed the Wales Coast Path all the way to Bangor. lovely day with clear views across to Beaumaris and Puffin Island. It was a high spring tide so many birds had been forced above the High Water mark for a few hours. Birdwatchers were peering out of the hides as I walked past Aber.

I spotted Ringed Plover, Little Egrets, Shelduck, Redshank, Wigeon, Teal, Lapwing, Gt. Crested Grebes and flocks of Dunlin and Oystercatchers. But I was put to shame when I called in the Spinnies bird hide at Aber Ogwen and saw their list for today was 43. Up the lane, over the Ogwen and through Llandygai to Bangor.



# BANGOR TO LLANBERIS



LLYN PADARN



AFON CEGIN FORD

Parked in Llanberis and caught the № 85 bus on an epic journey to Bangor via Brynrefail, Clwt-y-bont, Deiniolen, Rhiwlas and Ysbyty Gwynedd.

Started the walk at Port Penrhyn and followed Lôn Las Ogwen, meeting the Pilgrim's Way again at the ford over the afon Cegin. Herons high in the trees and a bat flying around in the sunlight.

I missed the turn-off footpath and ended up in Tregarth but picked up the trail again in Sling. Good views over Anglesey and I could almost see our house in Llansadron. Into the dark dark Woods under Moel y Ci with two or three woodpeckers hammering away, and frogspawn in the ditches, then up behind Rhiwlas and over the boggy moors past Maen Meddygon.

Over Moel Rhiven and down through Dinarwig to Llanberis. Goldeneye and Mergansers on Llyn Padarn. Back to the car at 17:30 - worn out!






Drove to Waunfawr and caught the 54 and 88 buses to Llanberis. Coffee in Cafe Gronant while changing buses in Caernarfon. Those free bus passes are very useful.

Walked up to have a look at the Afon Hwch waterfall then up to the old track leading over Cefn-du to Waunfawr. This is now part of the new Llwybr Hlechi Eryri (Snowdon Slate Trail).

I could see men working on the Snowdon Railway up near Halfway House, and the little train was running on the Llanberis Lake Railway. Ravens over the old slate tips.

Good views down the Llynn Peninsula but I couldn't see Bardsey yet. Coming down into Waunfawr I wandered down the little lanes Rhiannon and I used to walk many moons ago. Came out by the Afon Gwyrfai and watched grey Wagtails and a Dipper.

Cup of take-away coffee from the "New Shop" in Waunfawr, then home.





(12) PENYGROES TO LLANAELHAERN



After a five month break due to illness, I am back on the Pilgrim's Way, occasionally.

Two buses from Clynnog Fawr via Dinas to Penygroes, then down quiet lanes following the river Llyfni to Pont-y-llyn.

Buzzards, Swifts, Mushrooms and black berries today.


Another lane to Aberdesach beach and a rest on one of the benches watching the waves. Tide was too high to walk along the beach so I followed the cycle path alongside the A499 to Glynnog Fawr.

Bus from Llanaelhaearn to Clynnog Fawr. Splashed some water from St. Beuno's Well over my head (you never know?), then alongside the A499 to the Trefor turn off. Had a paddle by the pier then up the steep lane towards Bwlch yr Eifl. I have been over that way a couple of times so for some variation I carried on along the lane to Llanaelhaearn. A dead Barn Owl on the lane, Bilberries and black berries, and goats on the slopes of Yr Eifl (I once heard them "screaming" here).

(13) LLANAELHAEARN TO NEFYN



Caught the Llŷn Coastal bus (O Ddows i Ddows) from Nefyn to Llanaelhaearn and started walking back up the hill in the rain.

Turned down the lane before reaching Llithfaen and on to the byway and across to Pistyll. Sun and blue sky suddenly appeared with good views of St. Tudwal's islands and down to mid Wales.




CHARENTE STEAMSHIP COMPANY FLAG IN LLŶN MARITIME MUSEUM.


Called in the Llŷn Maritime Museum in Nefyn. Very interesting, including the company flag of the Charente Steamship Company who I used to work for.

AFON GEIRCH





No 8 bus from Tudweilog to Nefyn then back along the Wales Coast Path / Pilgrim's Way.

Across Afon Geirch, mentioned in 'The Fish Ladder' by Katherine Noorbury which I read recently.

About 40 Seals hauled out at Penrhyn Cwmiskin including one with a new born pup. Three cormorants flying around Porth Towy and more Gannets fishing further out.

Through a field with a bull in it and up past Doloni's Cafe (shut) and along the footpath back to Tudweilog

(15) TUDWEILIOG TO LLANGWNNADL

PORTH CYCHOD

Parked in Llangwnnadl and caught the Coastal Bus to Tudweilog. Walked back down to the sea at Porth Towyn, now deserted after the summer holidays.

Along the coastal path against a very strong headwind - the beginning of Storm Helene, past Porth Ysgaden and the other old harbours to Traeth Penllech. This is one of my favourite beaches, especially at low tide when you can walk its one mile length.

More seals and Choughs, some Wheatears and a large group of Goldfinches.

On to Porth Colmon then back up the lane to Llangwnnadl.

Had a look round St. Gwynhoedl's Church - a bit like entering the Tardis - three altars.




